POLYPHANT METHODIST CHURCH & COMMUNITY CENTRE Update for Lewannick Parish Council APM - May 20th 2025

Services are usually held every Sunday but during the last two quarters we have arranged united services with Pipers Pool on alternate Sundays to ease the pressure on our local preachers in the Launceston Circuit who serve 13 churches.

In September we look forward to welcoming a new Minister, Oseias da Silva, He and his wife, Rev Jane will be living at the Coad's Green Manse. He will no doubt lead a service at Polyphant when he has settled with in the churches for which he has primary responsibility: Coad's Green, Trebullett and South Petherwin. The Launceston Circuit also sends a Minister to Lewannick once a month so local residents will have an opportunity to meet him.

In Polyphant we are seeking grants to improve the property and are fortunate to have received a substantial donation to help us decorate the exterior of the church. Also a local group has donated £800 to the Community Hall which will be the basis for a grant to install improved heating in the Community Hall.

Polyphant Church Council is extremely grateful to receive the grant from Lewannick Parish Council towards the cost of maintaining the graveyard. We were also delighted to receive a grant from the Lewannick Wind Turbine Fund which enabled us to purchase and install a large TV screen in the church which is being used for services and community events.

We continue to raise funds for maintenance costs as the weekly running costs exceed our basic income which is donated by the Members. Additional income comes from the monthly coffee mornings, weekly Knit & Natter group and weekly Line Dancing classes. The new Polyphant Ladies Club meets monthly at the church and shares proceeds of their events with Polyphant Chapel.
